It is not too late. Still pondering attending this year's Great Lakes Regional Convention (June 25-28)? You still have time to register.

Why attend the Regional Convention, you might ask yourself? Many reasons.

You will get to <u>hear</u> and <u>see</u> a good number of splendid and very interesting organs by a variety of builders. These include: Skinners (E. M. and Aeolian), Pasi, Casavant, Buzard, Reuter, Wolff, and Roderer.

You will hear these organs played by some well- known <u>organists</u> from our Region (and beyond), including Vincent Dubois (the Titular organist at the Cathedral of Notre Dame in Paris), Aaron David Miller, Eric Budzynski, Stephen Buzard, Nicole Keller, Yun Kim, Scott Montgomery, Christa Rakich, and Madeleine Woodworth. Their concerts/recitals will feature some "classic" organ favorites and some newer gems.

The <u>workshops</u>—as always—will be stimulating. They include: Music for Organ and Instruments, Jazz Worship, Taizé Worship, Gospel Worship, Building and Maintaining Youth Choirs, E.M. Skinner in Chicago, a Choral Reading Session, and Continuo Playing for Organists, The North Shore's Scholarship Program, Professional Development, and AGO Certification.

Don't forget the Regional Quimby <u>Competition</u> and Recital featuring fantastic young organists from our Region.

And if this isn't all enough, there are <u>receptions</u> every night with a cash bar, many <u>exhibitors</u>, a lunchtime <u>carillon</u> concert at the Chicago Botanic Garden, and a <u>final banquet</u> and <u>gala reception</u> on closing night! Also, it will be great to be together with your organ colleagues—old friends from previous conventions, and hopefully some new friends.

Then—if you have time and want to hear and see even more—you can add on "A Taste of Chicago," featuring four significant organs in the city: Madonna del Strada Chapel at Loyola University (Goulding and Wood), St. Chrysostym's Church (Fisk), Holy Name Cathedral (Flentrop) and Fourth Presbyterian Church (Quimby). This will be on the day following the convention, Thursday, June 29, from 8 am until 1 pm.

THE EVENING THAT LEXINGTON BECAME BAROQUE

It was a rainy evening in the Lexington, Kentucky area on Wednesday, April 5, 2023. I had planned to attend a musical program at St. Augustine's Chapel on the University of Kentucky campus, but was not looking forward to being out in a long rainstorm. But this was one musical event that really interested me, and I was determined not to miss it! So off I went.

Arriving at the chapel, I finally found parking and walked in. It was a nice crowd of organ enthusiasts, trumpeters, and students and faculty from the



University's School of Music. I always love to hear Dr. Robinson perform at the organ console, so I greeted him on my way in to be seated. The guest artist was trumpeter Josh Cohen, who performs exclusively on baroque trumpets, and is a nationally recognized expert in that area of music.

I noticed that the trumpets used were different, and were valveless, but there is much more to the story. I learned that these were modern copies of the baroque valveless trumpets, and that some of the students and other performers had built their own period instruments during a recent workshop at Indiana University. Normally tuned at A-415, the ones for this performance were adjusted to play at normal A-440 pitch. The baroque literature (1600-1750 C.E.) chosen for this event would have been tuned at a lower pitch for both solo pieces as well as for baroque choirs and orchestras of that time.

Dr. Robinson was accompanying Mr. Cohen on the University's Flentrop tracker organ (1975, Dutch) which has been housed at St. Augustine's Chapel since 2003. Schuyler Robinson spoke to the audience concerning the tuning of this instrument, indicating that it has always been tuned to the Werkmeister III tuning which has allowed the School of Music students to perform on period instruments which were tuned to early music standards, thus allowing the university's students to have experience playing period instruments with period tunings. To quote Dr. Robinson: "This special tuning allows certain chords to sound 'sweet,' while others are more dissonant, providing more colorful variety in the composer's choice of keys. This temperament shows a preference for the 'white keys.' "I personally found this fascinating. While I had studied this in music history classes early in my career, it has been a long time since I have even thought about it.

The composers of the performed music were all solidly from the baroque era. The first two pieces performed were with Dr. Robinson, organ, and Josh Cohen, baroque trumpet. The first was Giovanni Viviani's (1638–c. -1693 C.E.) Sonata No. 1 for Trumpet and Organ in five movements. The second piece performed by these two accomplished musicians was Purcell's Sonata for Trumpet and Organ in three movements. Both were outstanding and most enjoyable, and the audience was very appreciative. My favorite piece was Ciacona by Christian Ritter (probably around 1645-1725 C.E.) who was a composer and organist of the North German organ school at that time. This piece was performed by Josh Cohen, Jason Dovel (UK Professor of Trumpet), and Schuyler Robinson, organist. Thoroughly enjoyable indeed!

Next came 'Marches and Quick Steps (1799)" performed by the award-winning UK Baroque Trumpet Ensemble (students) directed by Victor Yuen who is a DMA student in Trumpet who also works as a UK teaching assistant. The student trumpeters, all dressed in black, performed two different fanfares by John Hyde on period trumpets of the baroque era. One of the high points of the evening was the performance of "To God, Our Strength" from Occasional Oratorio by my very favorite baroque composer, George Frederick Handel (1685-1759). This piece of music was played by Josh Cohen, Jason Dovel, and Victor Yuen (all on period trumpet) and accompanied by Dr. Schuyler Robinson, organist. The program ended with the five movement "Suite in D," again by Handel.

It suffices to say that I hung out after the program to pick the brains of the musicians involved. It was definitely worth coming out on a rainy evening in Lexington. I encourage others to attend these types of musical endeavors by our University of Kentucky School of Music students and faculty.

Keyboard Musician ACCOMPANIST Position WHITE OAK POND CHRISTIAN CHURCH

Position: Keyboard Musician/Accompanist White Oak Pond Christian Church seeks to call a trained musician as their Keyboard Musician/Accompanist. This person should be experienced in church music while knowledgeable and proficient in a variety of styles and genres of music such as hymnody, classical, gospel, jazz, praise music, etc. This position primarily requires the playing of piano accompaniments, but may also require use of other instruments and technology in musical programming, such as electronic keyboard, organ, etc.

The Keyboard Musician/Accompanist will advise and collaborate with the Senior Minister to plan music that creates a cohesive and thoughtful worship experience. This position is Part Time and includes Sunday morning worship, work with soloists/ ensembles, and personal practice time.


Accountability: The Keyboard Musician/Accompanist is accountable to the Senior Minister and the Personnel Committee. A yearly review will be conducted by the Senior Minister. This review will be shared with the Keyboard Musician/Accompanist and the Personnel Committee.

Job Description: • The Keyboard Musician/Accompanist will provide music during worship services (Hymns, Preludes, Postludes, etc.). • The Keyboard Musician/Accompanist will provide all keyboard support required by ensembles and soloist as needed in worship and rehearsals. All music will be provided 2 weeks in advance to allow for preparation and rehearsal arrangements. • The Keyboard Musician/Accompanist will provide piano music for other special services (Ash Wednesday, Lenten, Easter and Advent) as agreed upon. These must be scheduled through written or oral agreement with the Senior Minister or Worship Committee. • The Keyboard Musician/Accompanist is not required to play weddings or funerals performed at or in association with White Oak Pond Christian Church. The Keyboard Musician/Accompanist will be given the first opportunity to play the wedding or funeral service, should they so choose. Appropriate compensation will be agreed upon and provided by the reserving party. • The Keyboard Musician/Accompanist will work with the Senior Minister and/or the Worship Committee as a part of the staff of the church to help shape the music (with the approval of the Senior Minister) for all absences for vacation, illness, or other reasons, whenever possible. Vacation days must be approved by the employee's supervisor no later than two weeks prior to use. • The Keyboard Musician/Accompanist involved on Sunday mornings.

Wages/Compensation: • The Keyboard Musician/Accompanist will be compensated with a weekly salary of \$125.00. • The Keyboard Musician/Accompanist will be given two (2) Sunday vacation days annually the first year with increases coming with time of service. Termination: • Either party may terminate this contract upon 30 days written notice to the other.


