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Reflections on Preparing for the Service Playing Exam

When Diana Nyad completed her record-breaking swim from Cuba to Florida, she shared her life lesson: Never, ever give up. Well, I can hardly swim from one end of a swimming pool to the other, but aiming for the Service Playing Certificate is about equivalent to swimming from Cuba to Florida for me. Therefore, every day I repeat the motto: Never, ever give up!

Each month, I would like to talk about one aspect of the exam and how I am approaching it. This month I will talk about the repertoire.

I started thinking about what I wanted to play long before I was ready to start preparing for the exam. I read the lists in TAGO, looked through my music to see what I had, bought a few things that sounded interesting and played around with them. When the time came to make decisions, I had a pretty good idea already of what my choices were. In Group A, you have a choice between Bach and Buxtehude. Well, I was born with Lutheran DNA, and I was getting goose bumps over *Herzlich tut michverlangen* when I was three years old, so naturally I gravitated toward Bach's *Orgelbüchlein*. I had already played many of these pieces, but I took the advice that I had read in one of the preparatory resources from the Guild, and chose two pieces that I had never played but wanted to and began learning them. After a while, it became apparent that one of these was much more likely to be successful in the amount of time I had, so I focused on it. My choices from Groups B and C were likewise matters of the heart. I simply picked pieces from the list that I fell in love with. And that is so important. It has become apparent that if I did not love the music, I would have been so tired of it by now, so unwilling to go on and polish all the little details, so terribly weary. But loving it makes it all worthwhile.

Finally, get a good teacher. Doing so has made an incredible difference to me. I haven't studied for years and was, quite frankly, rather terrified to work again with a teacher. But, you know what? I found out that there is more good than bad about my playing. And my teacher has helped me interpret the music in a way that I never could have done on my own. If you can't afford a teacher, perhaps an organist friend would be willing to work together with you.

So, here's the bottom line as far as repertoire goes:

Never give up, love your music, and get a good teacher. You will be on your way to success.
