### **Lexington AGO Officer Installation and Abbey Visit**

No, not Downton, but Kentucky's own Gethsemani! Enjoy an afternoon of fellowship, music, and contemplation at the Abbey of Gethsemani in Trappist, KY, where monks have lived, worked and prayed for over 150 years.

You may be familiar with their cheese, fruitcake, and the writings of the notable Thomas Merton, but praying the Liturgy of the Hours is at the heart of religious life at the Abbey. Singing through the 150 psalms according to a 2-week cycle forms the backbone of their 7 daily prayer services, and our chapter will have the opportunity to participate in one of them.

We will begin our excursion with lunch in Bardstown at Talbott Tavern at 11:15, including the Installation of Officers led by our chapter chaplain, Larry Sivis. From there, we proceed to the Abbey, where Br. Luke will show and invite us to play the church's LeTourneau organ, followed by the 2:15 service of None, approximately 15 minutes long and open to the public. Next, we adjourn to the choir room for an introduction to the choral works of Gethsemani composer Fr. Chrysogonus Waddell. Br. Luke will share some of Waddell's unpublished hymns written for the Abbey, and Bonnie Harstad will lead a readthrough of several octavos published and provided by World Library Publications. From that point, you are free to roam the Abbey's 1200 acres, visit the Welcome Center, and attend the 5:30 Vespers service if desired, leaving whenever you wish.

Feel free to bring a guest or family member to participate in our planned activities, or to explore the church and grounds on their own. For more information about the Abbey of Gethsemani, visit their website at www.monks.org; drive time from Lexington is approximately 1.5 hours.

On Saturday, March 22, the Lexington chapter celebrated J.S. Bach's birthday by performances on organ and harpsichord at the 9th annual Bach Marathon at Maxwell St. Presbyterian and performances of additional Bach works at Faith Lutheran, both in Lexington. This year's marathon featured the six Trio Sonatas and brings an end to the performance of J.S. Bach's complete works for organ.

The celebration featured area musicians (from left to right) Jerry Martin (BWV 528 and *Sinfonia* from Cantata No. 37), Mark DeAlba (BWV 529), John Linker (BWV 525), Greg Kimmerer (Invention No. 13 in A minor, BWV 784), Allison Kimmerer (Two Minuets from the "Klavier Suite in g minor" and Minuet in G Major from "Noteboook for Anna Magdalena Bach"), Will Kimmerer (Sinfonia No. 1 in C Major, BWV 787), Glenna Metcalfe (BWV 526), Zach Klobnak (BWV 527), and Dr. Schuyler Robinson (BWV 530).

## Former Lexington AGO Member Rebecca Abbott Extends Invitation to Bach Conference

Dear AGO Lexington Members,

As a former member of the Lexington AGO, I would like to make sure you're aware of two opportunities in my new area north of Columbus, Ohio.

First, the American Bach Society is holding their Biennial Conference on the theme of "Johann Sebastian Bach and His Sons" at Kenyon College, Gambier, Ohio, May 1-4 (www.americanbachsociety.org). All concerts are free and open to the public (except David Schulenberg's lecture-recital). For those who wish to register to hear the papers and attend the catered meals, the fee is \$90/adult (\$65/student) before March 15, and \$100/adult (\$75/student) after March 15.

Since Kenyon College is only 5 to 7 minutes from our house, my husband and I would like to offer any meals not included in the conference registration or hotel to interested members of the Lexington AGO; please contact us at hymnnotes@yahoo.com by April 23 to let us know which meals you would like and whether you have any food allergies.

Second, the Hymn Society's National Conference will be in Columbus this year, July 13-17 (http://the-hymnsocietyconference.wordpress.com). Early registration ends on May 1. I'll be presenting in the first round of sectionals, on Monday, July 14, at 1:30 PM, on "Hymns for a Crisis: Communal Preparations for Small to Large Calamities." As medical and rescue teams prepare for crises, so should congregations, whether for the certainty of individual death or for large-scale catastrophe. How should congregations prepare to support each other and their communities? Participants will come away with an adaptable plan for building a communal "hymn memory" and rationale for how this plan will provide comfort and relief. ## **News from AGO Headquarters**

### **Pay Dues Electronically Using ONCARD**

By now you should have received an email or letter from AGO headquarters about ONCARD, the new electronic dues payment system. The following is excerpted from an email from AGO headquaters:

"Beginning with the 2014-2015 dues year, as directed by the National Council, AGO National Headquarters will collect dues directly from members. We will remit the chapter portion of those dues to chapters by an ACH transaction or check.

"In conjunction with this we are excited to announce the national launch of ONCARD, a suite of secure online services that includes renewing membership and making contributions by credit card, updating addresses and personal information, and other features.

"Please access ONCARD now to review and update your personal information, especially your email address. Because full contact information for our members has not always been communicated to us, there is a chance that upon your first login to ONCARD you will find we have old and/or incomplete information on file for you. For this, we hope you are patient and forgiving as you make needed corrections.

"In April AGO National Headquarters will send membership renewal notices by email to members who have a valid email address in our database, and by regular postal mail to members who do not. Those without an email address or computer access will pay dues to AGO National Headquarters from a paper invoice.

"To login to ONCARD and review/update your personal information click here. You will be prompted for a username and password. Your username is your first initial plus your last name, as it appears on your TAO mailing label (e.g., jsmith for John Smith). The password is your Member ID, which can be found on your TAO label."

### **Educator and Organist Richard Dwyer to Retire**

Richard Dwyer, FAGO, will retire on April 27, following more than 50 years of service in church music. Forty-five of those years were spent in Lexington, Kentucky, in positions at Calvary Baptist, Centenary United Methodist and, most recently, First United Methodist-Andover Campus. Also, he has been adjunct organ instructor at Asbury University, Asbury Theological Seminary, Berea College, and Eastern Kentucky University, and presently is instructor of organ at Transylvania University. For fifteen years he has been accompanist for the Lexington Chamber Chorale. Richard was Sub-Dean of our AGO Chapter for two years, Dean for four years and Secretary for six years. He plans to reside in Lexington and will be available for interim and substitute church positions.
