


Twelfth Night Party




Dr. Necia Harkless

Word has already gone out to the parish regarding the death of Dr. Necia Desiree Harkless. I join with her family and other parishioners in grief of losing this dear soul. She was 94 years young.

I snapped this photo of Necia at the console of Good Shepherd's organ shortly after its installation in June 2013. I've never known a more supportive and enthusiastic musician and general musical cheerleader than Necia.

Necia was a lifelong student in many disciplines, including music. She enjoyed trying her hand at composition and has a couple of anthems and many Anglican chants to her credit. I will miss our weekday visits where she would hang out in my office and tell me with great enthusiasm what her next composition project would be. One year she resolved to write an Anglican chant every day during Lent as her "Lenten discipline." While she didn't realize this goal in its entirety, her enthusiasm about setting her sights on such a lofty accomplishment was inspirational.




Good Shepherd Choir has been privileged to deliver premiere performances of one of her anthems and several Anglican chants both here and in Britain. In 2006 we dedicated an entire evening service to recognizing her lifetime of achievements. We all agreed it would be much better to recognize someone of her stature while she was well and healthy. And, thanks be to God, she lived another nine years after that!

Since the installation of our new organ, Necia would practice daily at the organ until her health dictated otherwise. On the Sundays she felt well enough, she would sit behind the organ console and we'd get into mischief in our little "musician's corner." During the closing voluntary she'd read the music over my shoulder and often hum along (actually that drove me nuts, as it's rather difficult to concentrate with such "interference!).

I miss my friend, but am happy that she is in a place with no pain, and may join the saints in eternal life. The inspiration she brought to so many is a testament to a rich life lived to the fullest. Rest in peace, Necia.
