AGO CERTIFICATION EXAMINATIONS: Why They Matter

I am excited to hear from our chapter Dean, Jane Johnson, that some of our members are considering certification exams for the **Service Playing Certificate (SPC)** and the **Colleague Certificate (CAGO)**.

Across our nation each year, organists of varying levels of skill in the AGO membership take the Service Playing Test. Obtaining this certificate shows employers (churches, synagogues, and other organ-related positions) that the organist has demonstrated proficiency at the organ console. A practical test, it highlights many of the required skills for playing the organ for a religious service, funeral, wedding, or civic ceremony.

My own journey with the AGO Examinations began after I had already been a church organist for several years. Having taken organ and voice lessons from middle school through high school at Georgetown College (Daniel Tilford, professor of organ), I had decided that my applied area in college would be voice. I served as a church organist and choir director during and after college, so I decided to take the Service Playing Test in my early thirties. I hired Gerard Faber, AAGO (former professor of organ at Asbury College and Dean of the Lexington Chapter 1974-1976) to prepare me for the exam. To my surprise, it was interesting and challenged me to return to my earlier training as an organist and to ditch some bad habits in hymn playing that I had developed over the years. There were also sections on basic transposition of hymns, organ literature from various periods that I revisited, accompanying psalms and choral anthems, and a short sight reading test. In the end, after studying with Mr. Faber for a few months, I was ready to take the Service Playing Test. I passed, and studied further with Mr. Faber for my CAGO certification exam the following year.

Gerard Faber, my instructor, was from Holland. His master's degree equivalent was not recognized in the United States by some colleges and universities. However, Asbury College did recognize his AAGO certification from the AGO as equivalent to at least a master's degree in organ, so he was able to teach there. So you can see that AGO certifications are indeed useful.

That brings us to the Colleague Certification exam (CAGO). Once an organist has passed the Service Playing Test or already has sufficient proficiency, the next step can be the Colleague exam. The CAGO examination is geared to demonstrating the skills of the professional church musician. Each section of the typical worship service is explored in this test; organ literature of moderate difficulty, accompanying a choir or a soloist, leading and accompanying congregational hymns, sight reading, transposing, harmonizing, and improvising. Mr. Faber had to work with me for several months in order to prepare me for this exam. Those of you with a college degree in organ should have no trouble passing this exam, but you will still need to prepare for the exam given the wide variety of skill sets involved.

Passing my two AGO certification exams made me realize that I wanted and needed further study as a church musician. This realization led to my graduate studies of sacred music in seminary. Over the years, I have heard from others who have taken AGO exams that they found them to be beneficial in their work and whetted their appetites for further study. It is my hope that it will be the same for some of you, the members of the Lexington AGO Chapter.

By the late 1950s the Lexington Chapter had grown from 15 to 41 members, as reported by Betsy Steiner on September 8, 1959. To facilitate growth, in 1958 the chapter appointed area representatives for the purpose of recruiting new members from surrounding communities. Winchester, Georgetown, Paris, Frankfort, Danville, and Wilmore/Nicholasville had official representatives. Richmond, Versailles, and Mt. Sterling did not because there were no AGO members living in those towns.

In the fall of 1959, the chapter began exploring the possibility of hosting the 1963 AGO Regional Convention in Lexington. There was much enthusiasm for the idea expressed at the September meeting, and comments were made about the wealth of fine organs in the Lexington area. Apparently, the idea soon died because the 1963 convention was held in Columbus instead. As you know, the dream finally became a reality in 2011, nearly a half century later.



Phyllis Jenness

Of special historical interest, at the meeting on October 13, 1959, a new member was introduced who was on music faculty at UK. The legendary Phyllis Jenness joined the guild that semester. At that time she was also choir director at Everybody's Church in Lexington. Phyllis was a soloist at the chapter's Christmas meeting at Maxwell Street Presbyterian Church on December 8 in a program featuring Bach's Magnificat with Betty Mahan, organist, and Jean Marie Chrisman, choir director. Sadly, Ms. Jenness passed away less than a year ago on March 21, 2020.



CHURCH ORGANIST JOB DESCRIPTION

Settle Memorial United Methodist Church, Owensboro, Kentucky

The organist is responsible for playing the organ (Moeller three-manual 33-rank pipe organ) for traditional Sunday morning services, other special services throughout the year, and weddings and funerals as needed. The church organist works under the direct supervision of the music director and reports to the music director, who reports to the lead pastor.

Responsibilities

* Play organ for traditional Sunday morning worship services.

* Accompany the Sanctuary Choir during Wednesday evening rehearsals and Sunday morning worship services.

* Rehearse with and accompany soloists and small ensembles as needed.

* Accompany Sanctuary Choir for seasonal programs/ composer weekends/ cantatas as needed.

* Play organ for weddings as requested by couples, for additional remuneration.

* Play organ for funerals as requested by survivors or funeral home, for additional remuneration.

* Work in conjunction with the music director to help coordinate service music.

* Maintain a regular schedule of organ practice, special studies, and self-improvement to be prepared for all services and rehearsals.

* Supervise use of the organ by any others (guest organists, etc.).

* Work with music director to ensure the care and upkeep to the pipe organ.

Hours Per Week

15 hours per week is expected.

Vacation/ Absence

The organist will be allowed to take off up to 8 weeks during the year. Three of those weeks will be considered paid vacation. It is understood that the organist will work the weeks preceding and including Christmas and Easter. Time off must be scheduled at least three weeks in advance, except for emergency situations. The organist will arrange for a substitute for absences.

Additional information:

Settle has a long tradition of beautiful sacred and classical music. Besides weekly services, Settle also has a concert series, including an annual concert with the Owensboro Symphony. The music ministry also hosts a Living Composer Series. Recent composers who have come to Settle for weekend work with the choir include Mary McDonald, Lee and Susan Naus Dengler, Ruth Elaine Schram, Mark Cabaniss, and others. Settle is also blessed to have several music teachers and instrumentalists in the choir and congregation. Besides the pipe organ, the sanctuary also has a new Albert Weber grand piano and a one-manual harpsichord (8' and 4' stops.)

This is a permanent part-time position. Besides the church position, there are plentiful community opportunities for piano teaching and collaborative piano.
